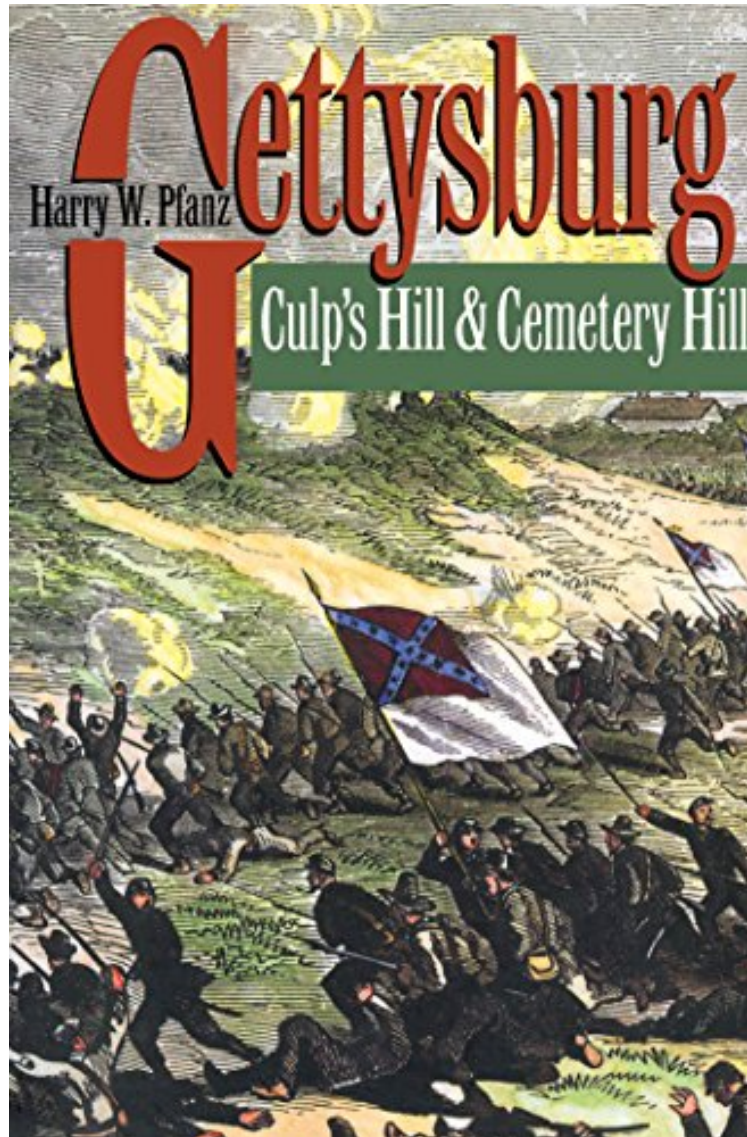

This book does an admirable job of covering this neglected part of the battle. It's certainly not for the casually interested.
