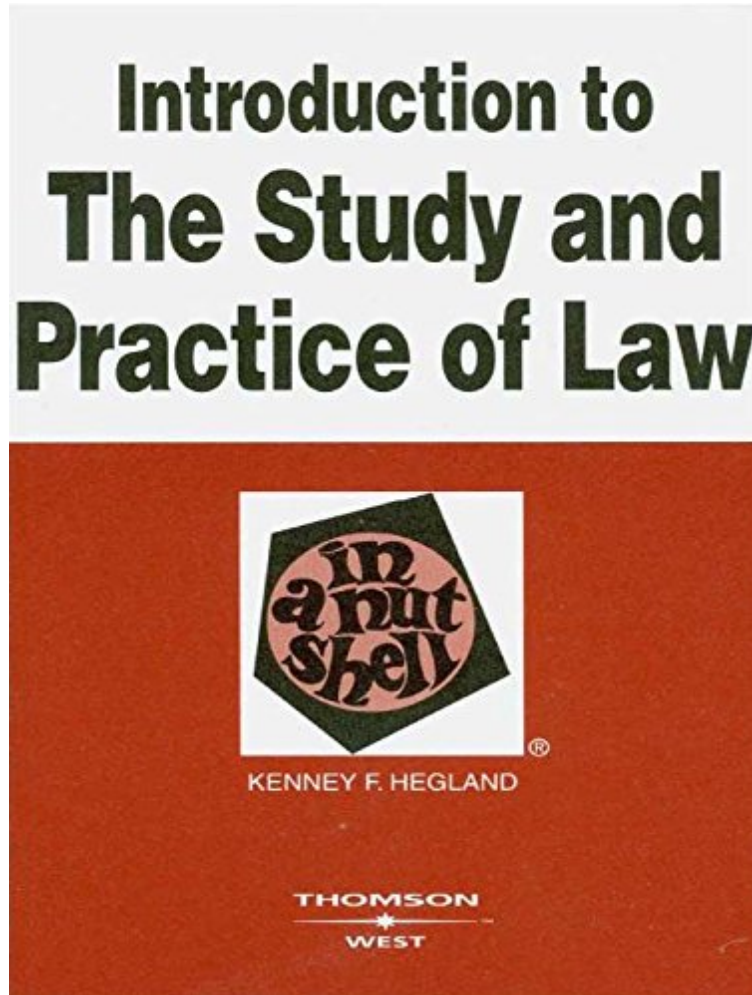

I introduce the basic skills you will develop: case analysis, legal argument, case briefing, legal writing and, ah yes, exam taking. You'll even have a few opportunities to practice. To reduce law school theory to real world practice, I'll walk you through a trial, from Unfortunate Incident, through pleading, discovery and then to the trial itself, repleat with angry objections, bewildering jury instructions and passionate closing arguments.Of course law school is not nearly as much fun as you have been told.
